Welcome



Welcome from everyone,

This report deals with the year up to 31 March 2020. Just one week after that year-end, we

had to close the Centre, furlough some of our staff, and others started working from home.

Even before Covid-19 struck, times were hard and we did well to record only a slight drop in grant funding compared with the previous year. We were finding it difficult to pay the day-to-day running costs of keeping the building open and paying the bills; costs which come to some £40,000 a year. In late 2019, we approached Ingol and Tanterton Neighbourhood Council (I&TNC) with a proposal to enter into a partnership with them, whereby they paid half our overheads over the next four years, with us working closely with the Council, helping them to deliver their 'community cohesion' and 'betterment' agenda.

Therefore, as the result of this, the good news is that we were able to show a surplus of £7,085 this year, instead of a £12,915 loss. Nevertheless, our cumulative loss over the last five years is still £15,787. Our target is to build up our reserves such that we have a minimum of three months Unrestricted Reserves. At this year's rate of expenditure, that would be £71k, so at £74,045 we are just over our target.

Looking on the bright side, though, we are very fortunate to have them, as we know we will survive current Covid-19 crisis. There are, I regret to say, many charities right now in a worse financial position than Intact.



Our reserves


We have a Designated Fund of £28,095 set aside to cover the cost of redundancies, should the worst come to the worst. In addition to that, our main free reserve, called Unrestricted Funds in the Accounts, at the end of this year amounted to £74,045. Our target is to build up our free reserves so that we have enough to tide us over for at least three months, in the event that our funding sources dry up completely. As our expenditure this year was £284,857, that means a reserve of £71,214 – so we are delighted to report that for the first time ever, we have hit that target – which is just as well, as we are facing unprecedented challenges in the 2020-21 financial year, because of Covid-19. It is almost inevitable that we will have to draw on those reserves in the coming year.

Drop-In and Direct Help

This service helps vulnerable and disadvantaged adults who are experiencing social inequality to receive 1-2-1 intervention. We aim to increase life skills, knowledge and confidence and help to overcome their problems by offering advice, guidance and support through a number of structured support sessions. We also offer 1-2-1 crisis support.

Employment and Skills

Our Training and Employment Team provide a whole range of employability support to help people get 'Back into Work' including:

- 1-2-1 coaching and mentoring;
- Advice and guidance;
- Training and skills development;
- · Volunteering opportunities;
- · Starting business support;
- Confidence building; and more.

Building Better Opportunities (BBO)

Intact is a delivery partner in two projects in Lancashire which is part of the nationwide Building Better Opportunities scheme which brings together funding by the European Social Fund (ESF) and The National Lottery Community Fund to help tackle the poverty and social exclusion faced by the most disadvantaged people in England. The programmes are:

- Invest in Youth (IIY) for people aged 15 -25
- Changing Futures (CF) for people of any age with multiple barriers to finding work

The Phase 1 contract came to an end in December 2019. Following the success of the project, a further contract was awarded for Phase 2, which runs up to March 2022.

Thrifty Kitchen is a pilot project funded by Preston City Council and the 'Our Food Co-op' Legacy Fund. The Project aims to equip people from Preston with a broad range of cooking skills, budgeting information, digital skills, money and time saving tips and tricks in a friendly, informal and hands-on session to help them get more out of their weekly shop.

The project utilizes food from FareShare, which consists primarily of food that would ordinarily go to waste.

We held weekly cook and eat sessions, where people learned to combine low cost store-cupboard ingredients to make healthy, well-rounded meals for themselves and their families. Sessions were attended by an intergenerational, international multi-skilled cross-section of the Preston community.

Prior to lockdown the project had exceeded expectations so we took it online.

Whitby's Pantry has now been open for a year. It opened in June 2019. A member-run food club saving families hundreds of pounds on their grocery bill each year. Part of a national network of 21 stores, Whitby's, Your Local Pantry offers a way to avoid financial crisis or to emerge from it. Additionally, through its partnership with environmental charity FareShare, it's part of the war on food waste.

During the COVID-19 lockdown, we have been cooking meals in the Pantry Kitchen. We have provided 79 nutritious meals.

The social interaction has been a gift for some users who only saw pantry staff during their week.

I like that I can feel comfortable accessing the pantry, I don't feel like I'm being judged, everyone is kind of similar, it's a safe setting.

Discovering Dobcroft

Dobcroft was our new venture funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund. This enabled us to recruit a team of nature loving volunteers and host a range of events. The 5 acres were broken into wetland, woodland and grassland areas.

Intact commissioned The Wildlife Trust to train the volunteers in land management skills, by running a weekly training course.

Preston Beekeepers helped the group of volunteers to build the skills to look after our very own beehive and reap our first harvest of honey, which was out of this world.

We were able to develop a whole range of volunteering opportunities to support the development of Dobcroft, including a Steering Group, Species Recorders, 'Bat

Group, Species Recorders, 'Bat Squad', Investigators and more.
