

Welcome



Chair's Welcome

We began the reporting year 2021/2022 in Covid Lockdown, which continued until July, as the Government implemented its 'phased exit'. We had hoped to launch the Sensory Garden on 25 June, but the extension of Lockdown saw us put the launch back to 27 August. In the event, though, it was well attended, and a great success.

Throughout Lockdown we had managed to keep the Centre open, especially the Pantry, as we saw demand increasing: and we were delighted to receive recognition for our efforts in the form of the Preston City Hero Award, presented to us by the Mayor.

After three years of modest surpluses, I am afraid that this year I have to report a deficit of £25,169, which wipes out the combined surplus of £17,948 for the previous three years. Expenditure was down year on year, at £337,873 compared with £367,085 the previous year: but this was more than offset by the fall in our total income, from £377,948 in 2020-21 to £312,704 in 2021-22. Of this, the biggest contribution was the fall in our funding bids received, down £36,115 from £317,075 in 2020/21 to £280,960 this year. Nevertheless we would like very much to thank those funders who have supported us this year. However, on a positive note, we managed to keep a team of volunteers on Dobcroft right through Lockdown, in compliance with the relevant regulations. Its value as a community asset continues to grow: and in September, we added a new member of staff, Ian Wright, as our Natural Heritage Well-being Co-ordinator. He hit the ground running, and under his guidance I am sure we will see Dobcroft going from strength to strength, using the funding we secured from the Big Lottery Heritage Fund for 'Digital Dobcroft'.

We faced uncertain times at the start of 2021, with the future of our food projects hanging in the balance due to funding changes. Knowing how many people rely on our services meant that we doubled our efforts to secure their future. Working together, our dedicated multidisciplinary team of staff and volunteers were able to secure funding. Our food, training and volunteering provision are safe for the foreseeable future.



The demand for Whitby's Pantry increases as food prices soar, however, access to food decreases and a waiting list starts.







Our reserves

We have a **Designated Fund** of £35, 810 set aside to cover the cost of redundancies, should the worst come to the worst. In addition to that, we have **Unrestricted Funds** of £74,699 – but that includes some Tangible Assets, so our actual 'Free Reserve' is only £19,165.

In an ideal world, we should have enough in **Free Reserves** to tide us over for three months, in the event that all our funding sources dried up completely. In fact, three months expenditure at the current rate is £79,937, so we have currently again fallen below our Reserve Target — partly as a result of this year's losses, and partly as a result of our redefining what goes into 'Free Reserves', to make it a more realistic figure.
