CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

Thank goodness that's over! That has to be our first reaction when we think about the year that's just gone. A year of disruption and trauma, of noise and cold and inconvenience. But, let's face it, it was worth it! From living in a building site, we have moved to occupying the finest state-of-the-art community facility, a building which not only looks good, inside and out - but, more importantly a building which will ensure that for the foreseeable future we can go on meeting our mission —'making a difference by being there'.

None of us will forget the thrill when the steel-work went up, and we suddenly realised for the first time how impressive the new build was going to be. And none of us will forget, nearly a year later, the official opening day, 15 April 2015, when the trustees, staff, students and volunteers, funders and friends, clients and local residents all came together for the first time to look round the building, now known as 'No 49'. It was standing room only in the new Community Hall when our Chief Executive Officer, Denise Hartley MBE, declared 'No 49' open, and thanked all our funders, not just the Big Lottery, but Lancashire Environmental Fund, Trusthouse Charitable Foundation, Garfield Weston Foundation, The Rank Foundation, Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation, Harold and Alice Bridges Charity and John Turner.

One small problem of the new build, though, is that this year's accounts are even more difficult to understand than normal! As a Charity, we have to set out our accounts in the way the Charity Commission lays down, with a balance sheet which shows the financial 'worth' of the charity at midnight on the last day of the financial year – together with statements of financial activities during the year up to that date. Because the new building cost more than half a million pounds, our Fixed Assets have gone up dramatically, to £859,110. But if you look at our Unrestricted Funds, which is all the cash we have to fall back on for a rainy day, we only have reserves of £48,946 – a lot less than the level set in our reserves policy, which is to have enough money in reserve to cover management, administrative and support costs for the next two months – which would mean around £60,000.

Turning to the Income and Expenditure account, which is a measure of how we did in the year just gone, we had budgeted to show a surplus of £20,000, as we need to get those reserves up – but in the event, because of the disruption caused by the building activity, and because of the increasing difficulty of raising grant income in the continuing uncertain economic climate, we ended up with a deficit of £15,175. I should also mention that our subsidiary company, Community Cogs (Whitby's) also had a difficult year, making a loss of nearly £8,000. Nevertheless, in the circumstances, the Trustees regard the performance of both Intact and Community Cogs as excellent, and the whole team are to be congratulated. And with the new building now open for business, and already often full to bursting, with a wide range of activities on offer, we are very hopeful that 2015-16 will be a good year for us – and for the community.

But of course we mustn't be complacent. Times continue to be hard for the Voluntary, Community and Faith Sector, and grant funding is getting ever harder to obtain. We have some very important grant applications coming up this year, which we need to see us through the next three years or so – and although Denise and the team are highly skilled in this area, pure luck often comes into it too!

Once again, can I thank the Board for their support, and thank all the team – staff, student social workers, and volunteers - for the hard work they have again put into Intact 'making a difference by being there'.

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the financial statements of Ingol and Tanterton Community Trust Ltd (the charity) for the year ended 31 March 2015. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

The charity also trades under the name INTACT.

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 6 October 2008 and amended by special resolution on 23 February 2009, and is a registered charity number 1128330.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

c. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

The Trustees who served during the year are set out on the Reference, Trustees and Admin details on page 1 of these financial statements. The Trustees meet on a quarterly basis as a minimum and more often if required. The Intact Sub Committees ie. Finance, Business Development and Personnel and Policy, meet on a monthly to six weekly basis to oversee the efficient running of the charity

d. RELATED PARTY RELATIONSHIPS

On the 5th December 2012 the charity acquired 100% of the shares in a limited company Community Cogs Limited (registered company number 08319660). This company operates a cafe and offers catering services to the community.

e. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

Objectives and Activities

a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the charity commission relating to public benefit.

The objectives of the charity are to further benefit the residents of Preston and the surrounding areas, primarily but not exclusively those inhabitants of Ingol and Tanterton ward, through the following:-

- the advancement of education through training, advice and guidance

- the relief of poverty and the promotion of good health through provision of drop in, advice, counselling, training, information and guidance sessions

- the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure time occupation for those persons who have need by reason of their youth, age and infirmity, social or economic circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life as a way of promoting community cohesion.

b. ACTIVITIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES

To achieve the objectives specified above, the charity provides a community centre and drop-in facility for members of the local community, where it offers a wide range of services and activities for local people including a range of confidential services from fully trained staff, students and volunteers, to meet the needs of the community, especially the vulnerable.

c. VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are essential in supporting the provision of activities at the centre. Provision of good quality volunteering opportunities is a key element of service delivery at the centre. Intact has a dedicated Volunteer Manager to ensure that an effective infrastructure in place to support the recruitment, retention and training of volunteers. Intacts' Investors in Volunteers quality mark status is a reflection of the quality opportunities that are available to all volunteers in supporting them in the delivery of Intact services at the community centre.

Intact ensures an effective recruitment, retention and training of volunteers which demonstrates our commitment to volunteers. With high retention rates, volunteers only move on if they find employment or further education. Intact currently has a bank of 47 active volunteers who support a wide range of activities and services in and out of the building. Our 'Investors in Volunteers' status means we are a highly valued and well represented organisation, attracting a high calibre of diverse and skilled volunteers.

The additional services provided by extending the building will enable Intact to offer a wider menu of volunteering opportunities, building up our strong volunteer base. Intact recruit new volunteers to the service, and our package of training and development for volunteers ensures our existing volunteers are up to a high standard.

Volunteering includes a range of episodic sessions coupled with short, medium and long term opportunities. Services are being developed and enhanced in the new building and will be managed, delivered and supported by our existing volunteer structure.

c. VOLUNTEERS - continued

Taking into consideration the provision of the new extension the volunteering structure reflects the future needs of Intact. The Volunteer & Skills Development Manager continues to manage all volunteers, and Intact offers opportunities in the following areas:

- Training volunteers, (which will also include opportunities for volunteers to become UK Online centres 1. champions)
- Centre Support Volunteers 2.
- Health Volunteers 3.
- Young Peoples Activities volunteers 4.
- Catering volunteers. 5.

215 people have been enrolled as volunteers since the beginning of the Reaching Communities Programme (Big Lottery funded in 2011). Volunteers that are currently active include, 13 volunteer Digital Champions, 4 volunteers on Reception, 18 Young Persons volunteers, 8 Kitchen volunteers, 1 Training volunteer and 3 Centre Support volunteers

Achievements and performance

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

Intact supports and serves people of Ingol & Tanterton, and elsewhere in Preston, by operating a Community Centre and running a range of specialised services for vulnerable and disadvantaged people, both at the centre and via outreach work. Most of our staff is funded on a project basis to deliver outcomes, most of which relate to: tackling economic exclusion; health issues; work with young people. Main activities include:

- One to one drop-in support and telephone access: Trained staff offer support and advocate e.g. benefits; 1. housing; poverty
- Access to specialist services e.g. CAB 2.
- Work Clubs: one to one support in job search; applications; interviewing skills; a weekly presence in the 3. Job centre, referring beneficiaries to Careers advice specialists; taking referrals. Intact currently support the Salvation Army running weekly work clubs at their Centre
- Basic/intermediate computer training to up-skill/apply for work on-line 4.
- Partnership projects e.g. CAB & Disability NW to Promote Community Resilience 5.
- Access to formal/informal learning delivered by local Colleges and Intact Project staff 6.
- Share IT partnership with churches offering food vouchers for those in greatest need 7.

- 8. Healthy Lifestyles: works to reduce health inequalities that are symbiotically linked to economic exclusion through:
 - a. Physical activity sessions/walking/running/cycling
 - b. Community garden/food growing
 - c. Weekly access to Food co-op; Access to healthy fruit/vegetables/salad at affordable prices
 - d. Healthy eating-cook and eat sessions; demonstrations; cooking on a budget
 - e. Weekly MOT sessions—Smoking cessation/Weight management/Blood pressure/diabetes checks.
- 9. Children and Young Peoples Services Manager (funded by Children in Need) provision of weekly homework, youth and craft clubs, holiday play schemes, and a range of physical and sporting activities i.e. netball, football, cycling; dance and drama

Financial review

a. RESERVES POLICY

It is the normal policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds which are free reserves of the charity which equates to two months unrestricted expenditure. This normally provides sufficient reserves to cover management, administrative and support costs for the ensuing two months.

Plans for the future

a. FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Intacts recent award of £567,032 grant from the Big Lottery has enabled the construction of a two-storey annexe to provide an 'improved local multi-purpose activity, educational and training centre for people of all ages. The ground floor multi-use room will be used for a range of leisure/recreational activity whilst the 2nd floor training room will enable a range of vocational and non-vocational learning activities. £25,000 from the Trusthouse Foundation helped construct an extension onto the existing kitchen, at the centre to provide more work space and to cater for the increasing demand in the Café. These 2 awards have helped Intact to double the size of the existing centre to increase services and ultimately increase demand in the cafe. Intact will embrace community health through new services & activities being delivered in the café with cook & eat sessions; healthy eating; cooking on a budget; nutrition; family cooking etc. The next 18 months will see Intact deliver the following Capital project outcomes which are:

- 400 Vulnerable Adults will have access to "Drop-in" support which will provide a lifeline and hope for a better future
- 2. 200 Adults will gain confidence and new skills through increased participation in volunteering, educational and vocational activities
- 700 Vulnerable adults will make new friendships, experience better health and happiness through increased participation in social, recreational and health related activities
- 4. 200 Young People will participate in fun learning activities leading to lifelong social skills, increased educational attainment and improved health and well being

MEMBERS' LIABILITY

The Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page . In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the charity has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donated services or facilities, which comprise donated services, are included in income at a valuation which is an estimate of the financial cost borne by the donor where such a cost is quantifiable and measurable. No income is recognised where there is no financial cost borne by a third party.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Fundraising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:
