CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

The chairman presents his statement for the period.

My first sad duty is to pay tribute to Bert Shepherd, Trustee and Treasurer for more than twenty years, who died last July. Bert made a massive contribution over the years, not just in doing our 'books' all that time but also as a volunteer and regular visitor to the centre. We all miss him.

I would also like to record our thanks to Mebs Ahmed, who stood down as a Trustee in April 2016, due to pressure of work. Although he had not been with us long, Mebs had made his presence felt on the Full Board and the Finance Committee, and we hope perhaps he will be able to rejoin us one day, if his work situation allows.

The accounts show that we made a loss on the year of just under £5,000, compared with a loss of just over £15,000 last year. Times are hard for charities at present. The demand for our services goes up and up, but getting funding to provide those services gets more and more difficult. We had hoped to make a surplus of £10,000 this year, to try and get our reserves back up to a safer level, and had budgeted for that sum - but in the event, after losing out on an important funding bid, we were heading for a loss of over £20,000 on the year. With the agreement of the staff, we took the decision before Christmas to reduce hours worked, and so were able to bring ourselves back from the financial brink. In March, we heard we had got some funding from Garfield Weston, and were able to restore the hours. I can't thank the team enough for the sacrifice they made to help keep us financially sound.

The fact that we have made losses in three of the last five years emphasises the need for us to have adequate unrestricted reserves. These are the funds we need for a rainy day – and unfortunately, it's pouring right now, and the outlook remains poor! Our aim is to have enough in reserve to tide us over for at least three months to cover our basic costs – wages, office costs, utilities etc – which come to around £1/4m a year. So we really need around £60,000 in reserve, rather than the £38,871 which our accounts currently show. Next year, we are budgeting to add £10,000 to those reserves – but keeping 'in the black' in the current environment really is a struggle.

Our funders last year provided us with £296,227, a similar figure to the previous year. I would like to thank all the funders – you will see the details on pages 21 and 22 – but I would also like to pay tribute to the efforts of Denise and all the team in writing all those successful bids. I would also like to thank them all for their other fund-raising efforts. This year, we raised £4,183 from general fund-raising, and a further £8,031 from Community activities and events – compared with only £2,477 the previous year. As funding bids get harder, the more money we can raise from our own efforts, the better.

On the Expenditure side, people costs - wages, NI and pension — are our main expenditure, amounting to £216,696, more than half the total. We had budgeted around £238,000, but were able to reduce this by nearly £20,000 thanks to the staff generously agreeing a reduction in their hours.

Once again, can I thank all the team – staff, student social workers, and volunteers - for the hard work they have again put into Intact. Can I also thank the Trustees, for all the effort they put in for no reward – or at least for no financial reward! Our job, as Trustees, is to ensure we keep a close eye on income and expenditure, and do our best to ensure that we can see and plan for at least a medium-term secure future for the charity. With that in mind, we are currently carrying out an 'Organisational Heath Check' of Intact, which began in January 2016, funded by the 'Building Capabilities; element of the Big Lottery's Reaching Communities Fund. As for the longer term, well, no-one can plan for twenty years ahead, especially in the current uncertain economic climate – but Intact's strap-line is 'Making a Difference by being there' – and I know I'm speaking for all of us when I say we still hope to be here far into the future!

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the financial statements of Ingol and Tanterton Community Trust Ltd (the charity) for the year ended 31 March 2016. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The charity also trades under the name INTACT.

Objectives and Activities

a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES

In setting objectives and planning for activities, the Trustees have given due consideration to general guidance published by the charity commission relating to public benefit.

The objectives of the charity are to further benefit the residents of Preston and the surrounding areas, primarily but not exclusively those inhabitants of Ingol and Tanterton ward, through the following:-

- the advancement of education through training, advice and guidance
- the relief of poverty and the promotion of good health through provision of drop in, advice, counselling, training, information and guidance sessions
- the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure time occupation for those persons who have need by reason of their youth, age and infirmity, social or economic circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life as a way of promoting community cohesion.

b. ACTIVITIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES

To achieve the objectives specified above, the charity provides a community centre and drop-in facility for members of the local community, where it offers a wide range of services and activities for local people including a range of confidential services from fully trained staff, students and volunteers, to meet the needs of the community, especially the vulnerable.

C. MAIN ACTIVITES UNDERTAKEN TO FURTHER THE CHARITY'S PURPOSES FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT

The charity operates a community centre and has organised fundraising events and received funding and service delivery grants to promote the activities available for all ages at the centre. (see the Review of Activities section for more details of the activities undertaken by the charity,)

d. VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are essential in supporting the provision of activities at the centre. Provision of good quality volunteering opportunities is a key element of service delivery at the centre. Intact has a dedicated Volunteer Manager to ensure that an effective infrastructure is in place to support the recruitment, retention and training of volunteers. Intact's Investors in Volunteers quality mark status is a reflection of the quality opportunities that are available to all volunteers in supporting them in the delivery of Intact services at the community centre. Intact ensures an effective recruitment, retention and training of volunteers which demonstrates our commitment to volunteers. With high retention rates, volunteers only move on if they find employment or further education.

Intact currently has a bank of 68 active volunteers who support a wide range of activities and services in and out of the building. Our 'Investors in Volunteers' status means we are a highly valued and well represented organisation, attracting a high calibre of diverse and skilled volunteers. The additional services provided by extending the building has enabled Intact to offer a wider menu of volunteering opportunities, building up our strong volunteer base. Intact recruits new volunteers to the service, and our package of training and development for volunteers ensures our existing volunteers are up to a high standard.

Volunteering includes a range of episodic sessions coupled with short, medium and long term opportunities. Services are being developed and enhanced in the new building and will be managed, delivered and supported by our existing volunteer structure. Taking into consideration the provision of the new extension the volunteering structure reflects the future needs of Intact.

The Volunteer & Project Development Manager continues to manage all volunteers and Intact continues to offers opportunities in a variety of areas.

299 people have been enrolled as volunteers since the beginning of the 'Life Changes' Reaching Communities Programme (Big Lottery funded in 2011) with specific examples below:

- Digital Champions (which includes opportunities for volunteers to become UK Online centres Champions and Work Club Champions)
- 57 Centre Support / Advice Champions
- 24 Health Champions
- 136 Young People's Champions
- 54 Catering volunteers.

Achievements and performance

a. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

Intact supports and serves people of Ingol & Tanterton, and elsewhere in Preston, by operating a Community Centre and running a range of specialised services for vulnerable and disadvantaged people, both at the centre and via outreach work. Most of our staff are funded on a project basis to deliver outcomes, most of which relate to: tackling economic exclusion; health issues; work with young people. Main activities include:

- 1. One to one drop-in support and telephone access: Trained staff offer support and advocacy e.g. benefits; housing; poverty
- 2. Access to specialist services e.g. CAB
- Work Clubs: one to one support in job search; applications; interviewing skills; a weekly presence in the Job centre, referring beneficiaries to Careers advice specialists; taking referrals. Intact currently support the Salvation Army running weekly work clubs at their Centre.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

b. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES - continued

- 4. Basic/intermediate computer training to up-skill/apply for work on-line
- 5. Partnership projects e.g. CAB & Disability NW to Promote Community Resilience
- The contstruction of a two-storey annexe providing an 'improved local multi-purpose activitity", educational
 and training centre for people of all ages has been a much needed and valuable asset to Intact and the
 community.
- 7. Share IT partnership with churches offering food vouchers for those in greatest need
- Healthy Lifestyles: works to reduce health inequalities that are symbiotically linked to economic exclusion through:
 - a. Physical activity sessions/walking/running/cycling
 - b. Community garden/food growing
 - c. Weekly access to Food co-op; Access to healthy fruit/vegetables/salad at affordable prices
 - d. Healthy eating-cook and eat sessions; demonstrations; cooking on a budget
 - e. Weekly MOT sessions-Smoking cessation/Weight management/Blood pressure/diabetes checks.
- 9. Children and Young Peoples Services Manager (funded by Children in Need) provision of weekly homework, youth and craft clubs, holiday play schemes, and a range of physical and sporting activities i.e. netball, football, cycling; dance and drama

This last 12 months has seen the delivery of the following Capital project outcomes which were required in the terms and condition of the Reaching Community Capital Grant:

- 400 Vulnerable Adults had access to "Drop-in" support which will provide a lifeline and hope for a better future
- 200 Adults will gain confidence and new skills through increased participation in volunteering, educational and vocational activities
- 700 Vulnerable adults will make new friendships, experience better health and happiness through increased participation in social, recreational and health related activities
- 4. 200 Young People will participate in fun learning activities leading to lifelong social skills, increased educational attainment and improved health and well being

As outlined in the annual report Intact superseded the numbers achieved which is testament to the work that has been carried out this year.

Financial review

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. RESERVES POLICY

It is the normal policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds which are free reserves of the charity which equates to three months unrestricted expenditure. This normally provides sufficient reserves to cover management, administrative and support costs for the ensuing three months.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The charity is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 6 October 2008 and amended by special resolution on 23 February 2009, and is a registered charity number 1128330.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

c. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

The Trustees who served during the year are set out on the Reference, Trustees and Admin details on page 1 of these financial statements. The Trustees meet on a quarterly basis as a minimum and more often if required. The Intact Sub Committees ie. Finance, Business Development and Personnel and Policy, meet on a monthly to six weekly basis to oversee the efficient running of the charity

d. RELATED PARTY RELATIONSHIPS

On the 5th December 2012 the charity acquired 100% of the shares in a limited company Community Cogs Limited (registered company number 08319660). This company operates a cafe and offers catering services to the community.

e. RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

Plans for future periods

a. FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

A new 3 year grant from the Reaching Communities Programme 'Changing Lives Together, Changing Lives Forever', along with a new Seasons Project, funded by the Peoples Health Trust will enable Intact to provide a wider range of new and exciting services and activities for the local community and its people. The acquisition of a local Nature Reserve (behind Holy Family Primary School) will form a big part of our service delivery to enable the provision of a range of environmental and community based projects. Intact is also a partner of the new Building Better Opportunities programme, which is funded by the Big Lottery and the European Social Fund. This project aims to engage with young people (16-24yrs) that are not in Education or Employment, older people (aged 50 and above) and disadvantaged people who live in the Lancashire area and have low or no skills, thereby preventing them from engaging with training and employment opportunities. Intact will play its part in supporting them in moving towards and into employment and we will be focus on the barriers to training, work and employment, taking an integrated approach to addressing these barriers.

MEMBERS' LIABILITY

The Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

The Trustees (who are also directors of Ingol and Tanterton Community Trust Ltd for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under company law the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Ingol and Tanterton Community Trust Ltd meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

No restatements were required.

1.3 Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the charity.

1.4 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.5 Income

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

1.6 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings..

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.

1.7 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised.

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Property

- 2% straight line

Fixtures & fittings

- written off over five years

Computer equipment - written off over three years

1.8 Investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. The Statement of financial activities includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluation and disposals throughout the year.

1.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount repaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.10 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.11 Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.12 Pensions

The charity pays pension contributions into their staff's personal pension schemes.
